Why do we have leap years? 2024 is a leap year

If we didn't have leap years, the calendar year would be shorter than the solar year by approximately 0.24 days. This means that every year, the calendar would fall behind the solar year by almost a quarter of a day. Over time, this would cause the seasons to shift, and our calendar would no longer match up with the astronomical year

Minister's letter:

This year we seem to be hardly clear of Christmas before Easter is on the way as it does fall relatively early this year. I found mini-Easter eggs in the supermarket among the discounted post-Christmas chocolates which did feel a bit too early, but gaps in the display meant some of the tiny eggs had already been purchased.

Does this continual availability of 'seasonal' items help us to plan and manage our budgets to spread the cost of products or special occasions across a longer time frame, or is it driven by research showing that products will find their way into shopping baskets and trolleys?

The analysis of how we all behave when browsing online or in person is very sophisticated with loyalty cards and online ordering generating vast amounts of data to enable predictions and targeted advertising or displays to be managed to be as tempting (for us) and effective (for the store) as possible.

Having our needs anticipated and met so easily can be rather convenient. So easy to go with the flow of ideas we see around us and follow the cues for buy this, try that and experience the offer which is going to be within easy reach on a shelf or delivered to the door within a matter of hours.

In many ways being served so completely with everything readily available makes life very comfortable, assuming we have the money to enable it of course. Instant isn't always good for us though.

Minister's letter continued:

This world works within the restrictions placed upon us by both time and space. If I have a great and wonderful idea it usually means I will have to put in some effort to achieve the outcome. I may have to plan, maybe learn or improve a skill, get several other things in place first so my great idea can eventually happen. Success needs effort, commitment, some dedication or staying power to achieve a possibly challenging but eventually worthwhile result.

Imagine if there was no period of waiting or effort at all. It may seem fantastic to have the idea, snap one's fingers and find the outcome is already perfect and complete with no more input from me, but a life of literally having anything and everything provided wouldn't really help me assess which aspect of life is more important than another, or where my own talents and skills find their best use.

Fairy stories end with 'and they all lived happily ever after...' when we know very well that life is not so simple or uncomplicated. Much as we may wish it otherwise, especially when things are extremely hard for us or those around us, life is about making choices and decisions which may be the best we can manage at the time.

This may not mean getting it right, we can only do the best as we see it, then learn each day as we cope with our own situation and the way other people also affect us. The ups and downs take time to work through, give us chance to learn and find new things out for ourselves. Quick solutions may be possible some of the time, but there is a lifelong challenge for each of us in the day to day progress we make as we manage each of those 24-hour periods in turn.

Groundhog Day is a popular North American tradition observed in the United States and Canada on February 2nd.

It derives from the Pennsylvania Dutch superstition that if a groundhog emerges from its burrow on this day and sees its shadow due to clear weather, it will retreat to its den, and winter will go on for six more weeks; if it does not see its shadow because of cloudiness, spring will arrive early. What Great British weather lore is the equivalent to Groundhog Day? Probably it is St Swithin's Day for predicting the British summer.

What does the New Church believe?
